Each semester students are given the opportunity to undertake many different strands of Art and to showcase their talents for the community.

How is Non Attendance Managed by the School

We have compiled a green folder for each year level at St Cecilia's. Inside the folder you will find a class list for the year level. There are five columns one for each day of the week. Teachers will record absentees for the week on this page making sure to date each column. At the end of the week the page is taken out and archived, with a new sheet ready for use by the teacher.

If a parent rings up to explain an absentee the teacher will receive a yellow sticker in the office tray so they know why the child is away, it could be due to sickness, holiday or late. The teachers must record absent students and have it into the office by 9.00am. Any child who is absent without a phone call or note a phone call will be made to the parents beginning from 9.00am on the day of absence. Indigenous parents will be contacted after 9.00am by our ATA. If a parent cannot be contacted a message will be left on their answering machine informing them of the absentee.

When a child is absent with or without a phone call a note still needs to be sent to school when the child returns for the roll book, a phone call does not suffice.

Not relevant to St Cecilia's Catholic Primary School as we do not have a Catholic Secondary School in Port Hedland.





- The Year 7 results are above National schools with a pleasing upward trend.


Spelling.

Grammar and Punctuation:




- The Year 3 results are slightly above National schools. Good upward trend.

Writing:


Year Three 2011 Writing (National)



Year Five 2011 Writing (National)




Year Seven 2011 Writing (National)




Observations

- Our 2011 results in writing indicate that we are above the National mean in Years 3 and 7 and below National mean in Year 5. This will need to be monitored.
- 2011 was the first year to test persuasive writing in the NAPLAN test, it is not possible to compare 2011 results over time. However the graph below shows our previous results over time. The graph shows previous results in Narrative writing and indicate that all year levels are slightly above the National mean with Year 3 and 7 showing a pleasing upward trend.

The 2011 results on the overview Numeracy graph show that in all three Year groups, we are slightly below the National mean. Year 3 and 7 showing an upward trend and Year 5 constant.
